Introduction: Over the last decade or more increased mobility,


access to information and globalization has resulted in apparent progress and increased opportunity but has also brought some

It has been found that one of the best paths to sensitising people to country, culture and community is through the performing arts especially the traditional classical arts where the content is spiritual and peace giving.

Heritage takes care to select themes, that bridge the disconnect that man has with Natural Heritage today. The endless list of environmental disasters is a direct result of this disconnect and irreverence. Each year various themes related to Mother Nature are selected. The pivotal message of the festival is "Srishti Rakshati Rakshita".

People of this culture relate simultaneously to the Supreme Godhead whether in sacred



The venues for the festival are Sacred Heritage spaces. Temples are a creation of our open culture that recognises and understands the diversity of people's approach to the Supreme and the understanding of the Divinity of all creation. Performing arts, architecture, visual arts, literature, poetry,

knowledge dissemination, environment and ecology were all a part of this temple culture. Bengaluru is home to beautiful temples some as old as 1200 years and Gudiya Sambhrama is an earnest attempt to revive this multi-faceted culture in temples today...

The resource person for any Heritage activity comes from the best of scholars, artists, academicians, naturalists and others.

Much research and work goes into creating thematic posters for display at the venues. Trees and plants are decorated and displayed with information boards.



"Gudiya Sambhrama...The Bengaluru Temple Festival" has been conducted annually for six successive years. The festival was held between 23rd January 2016 and 28th February 2016,

The theme selected for 2016 was Sacred Earth. Bhumi Devi. The festival brought together over a hundred artists and scholars of repute from across the country. Starting in the month of January for six week-ends and 7 venues, 20 temples resounded with the rhythm of dancing feet and the melody of music mingling with mystical chants and temple bells.,

The Heritage team took great care in finding an artist who worked with red earth and clay to create an image of Bhuvarahaswami the saviour of Bhu Devi in the Hoysala style that was installed on the stage and worshipped at every venue.

The striking features of GUDIYA SAMBHRAMA were many...

Gudiya sambhrama is reflective of the multi layered approach of our culture. Sharing culture and knowledge through the arts, talks and poster display of our heritage. It is an effort to rejuvenate the temple eco-system which was the fulcrum of the community.

It brought the best of art to the people making it accessible to a cross-section of society from



the flower vendor to the intellectual connoisseur of the arts. (No Entry Fee). Every artist included presentations focused on Sacred Earth.

The audience expressed their joy at such grand art being made available to them in such a wonderful ambience. All the artists were also thrilled by the forum that was created for the performances and the opportunity to research and present thematic compositions.

Apart from the main stage performances artists performed inside each of the 20 temples as part of the sangeetha and nrithya upachara to the Supreme. This was the highlight of the utsava to bring back the devopacharas in the temple as this practice is slowly fading away. Artistes have found devopacharas inspiring and uplifting. Short stories were narrated about Earth reflecting the cultural and ecological significance.








A main stage was put up at 7 of these Bengaluru temple spaces and a very special ambience was created with a huge backdrop illustrating the elements along with the Gopura—the temple tower.











Behind the Scenes

A spacious stage was erected in each venue taking care to make it sturdy and smooth for the dancers. Artistically designed platforms were placed for the musicians. Two green rooms were installed next to the stage.

The best of sound and lighting was arranged for every venue. Generators were organized for an uninterrupted power supply during the performances.

Heritage took all the measures to take care of the outstation artists and their hospitality. Hotels were booked in advance to make the artists comfortable and food was arranged according to their requirements.

Transport was arranged for their arrival and departures and also to the programme venue.

All artists including their Gurus present were blessed with divine chanting by the Pradhana Archakas while they were given mementos by Heritage.

Memento to all the artists and chief guests was a sacred plant "Tulsi", a pack of Organic Fox tail millet with a small write up about traditional Indian millet varieties and recipes, a book on spirituality and life, fragrant incense sticks in a paper bag to convey the message – "Avoid plastics".













Audience were largely temple going public, vendors, art connoisseurs, and families with young children, nature and conservation club members, home makers, lecturers, professors, young photographers and artists.

Sanskrit scholars Dr. S. R. Leela and Shatavadhani Dr. R. Ganesh wrote thematic poems in Sanskrit and Kannada that were used by the artists for their performances.

Performers and Performances:

We began this year celebrating Sacred Earth at 700 years old Bull temple - Sri Dodda Basavanna temple in Basavangudi with two days of soul stirring dance and music on 23rd Jan and 24th Jan 2016. The festival was inaugurated by Sri Prakash Belawadi a well-known journalist, theatre director, actor and award winning film director. Rukmini Vijaykumar's energetic and intense Bharatanatyam performance kept the audience spell-bound after which the young team of Yaksha Kala Academy regaled the audience with a brilliant Yakshagana performance, 'Veera Abhimanyu' featuring powerful portrayals by children.

The second day began with a wonderful talk on Bhumi Devi by Dr S R Leela a renowned Sanskrit Scholar and Vice President of Samskrutha Bharati. This was followed by a Mohana Veena concert by Padmasree Vishwamohan Bhatt accompanied by Sri Ravindra Yavagal on the tabla, transporting the audience to a world of melody. Dr Subramaniam Swamy, who arrived just as Panditji played Vande Mataram, spoke about the revival of temple culture and how GUDIYA SAMBHRAMA was a great effort in that direction.

The second week-end on Temple Street in Malleswaram, devotees and art connoisseurs who witnessed the Sundara Kandam of Ramayana by Bharatanjali troupe from Chennai on 30th Jan 2016 were totally immersed in wonderful art. Sri Sri Yathiraj Jeeyar Swamiji, who has been a great support to our initiative, with his divine presence and short speech about Mother Earth, blessed all the artists and organizers. On the 31st people were transported to a realm of peace by Pandit Rattan Mohan Sharma and a vibrant group of accompanying artists with Haveli Sangeet. A committed scientist from IISC Sri A R Shivakumar presented a talk about Earth and water conservation.

Heritage began a three question quiz contest each day about the theme, the temple and that evening's performance. The prize was co-sponsored by Swarajya and Kavade Hive, it was a treat to see a very responsive audience eagerly vying to answer the questions too.

On Sunday the evening began with a sharing of thoughts on soil and agriculture by Sri. M CV Prasad who came all the way from Madanpalle, (Andhra Pradesh) an avid organic farmer with a close connect to Bhumi Devi. This was followed by Ravichandra Kulur on the flute while Karthik Nagaraj played the violin and they were accompanied by 3 wonderful artists on various percussive instruments. The audience kept beat and were so immersed in the music that none realised how time had flown by.

















Fourth weekend at 'Devagiri' the hill of gods was replete with song and dance in celebration of Mahi Maatha, the earth mother. The event on Saturday had an auspicious beginning as the lamps were lit to the resounding Vedic chants of the Devagiri Varaprada Venkateshwara swamy Temple Archakas.

The audience were rooted to their seats and did not want to leave at the end of such an enjoyable and serene evening. The community spirit in this temple is indeed to be nurtured and cherished.







eritage is celebrating the sixth edition of 'Gudiya Sambharama - the Bengaluru Temple Festival' till February 28. This year, the festival theme is 'Sacred Earth/Bhumi Devi'.

The festival, which is a mix of music, dance and arts, found wide resonance last year with the participation of thousands of Bengaluru's citizens comprising regular devotees, families in the temple neighbourhood, senior citizens, flower vendors and connoisseur of the performing arts.

This year's theme comes in response to the profound challenges that confront Planet Earth today — Climate Change.

A temple festival to celebrate culture

Bengaluru has always been known for being a cultural hub — be it in the sense of traditional practices or otherwise. And in times where there is no dearth of such activities, it is not a surprise if you haven't heard of Gudiya Sambhrama hosted by the Heritage organisation, meaning the temple festival. Although conceived five years ago, the not-for-profit organisation is relatively unknown, mostly because of its relatively informal structure. But let that not lead you into doubting their impact.

"We are an organisation that looks at working at anything that disseminates traditional knowledge systems," says Supriya Komandur, who co-founded Heritage with Rekha Raghavan and Vijayalakshmi Vijaykumar. The founders explained that they began their initiative by organising workshops and seminars related to dance, music, Sanskrit and Indic studies.

Gudiya Sambhrama aims at promoting Indian traditions by organising cultural programmes in the premises of temples The idea behind starting a festival like this was to make it accessible to common people, thereby cultivating interest in the masses. Classical music or dance performances have always only drawn a niche crowd - to attend them, one often has to purchase tickets or passes, and that proves to be an expensive affair for the layman. Also, it is the same crowd that ends up going everywhere. So to put an end to such a trend, Heritage came up with the idea of a temple festival. It entails performances by artistes (dance, music etc) that is spread over six-to-eight weekends in the City during the January-February period.

"Temples were often centres of knowledge and community development in the past. But they have become more commercial over the years, So we decided to host this in many neighbourhoods across the City because people can't travel everywhere," Supriya reasons.

Another intention behind such an initiative is to draw youth and children. So, with the belief that all things are a part of nature, they base their festival on a different theme every year. Last year, the theme was sacred water, and this year, it was sacred earth. They have scholars pening poems for them based on each theme so they can reach out to a wider audience. They have had instances of children going back home and asking their parents about things they have probably picked up at the festival. So one can be assured that there is some kind of awareness that is being created, they believe.

When it comes to organising programmes too, they have a meticulous process in place. There is a selection process involved, wherein artistes apply, making their intentions clear as to why they are keen to participate. They ensure that the applicant knows the Festival's purpose, motive and theme completely enough to be committed to the cause. Needless to say, it is only those truly deserving artistes who are aspiring to be professionals are picked. This is not a spot for those who are looking at it as a hobby. All the slots are curated and candidates are picked by a special committee.

Even established artistes who perform at the Festival are very understanding of them and charge only a part of what they would normally charge otherwise. Gudiya Sambhrama has been organised in several localities across Bengaluru, evoking good responses in most cases, which has been a gratifying experience for the organisers. People who initially started coming out of curiosity later developed interest and stayed and came back the following years. The migrant population too has supposedly taken well to the fest.

The Festival is being organised in Hyderabad starting this year by a different group, under Heritage's expert guidance. So, does Gudiya Sambhrama look at expanding into other parts of Karnataka? "We want to, but do not have the resources or time to do so. If any other individual or organisation is interested to start this, we would like them to take the oms. But we will be fully supportive in whatever way we can," they say.
